CLOSE UP

A new exhibition offers unexpected insights into Picasso's world

Rare works by Pablo Picasso will go on display alongside well-known masterpieces at the National Portrait Gallery this autumn. The first major exhibition of his portraiture for more than 20 years promises to be full of surprises – including loans from the Centre Pompidou in Paris and New York's MoMA – and traces his changing techniques, from the realist portraits of his boyhood, through caricature, to more spontaneous expression.
